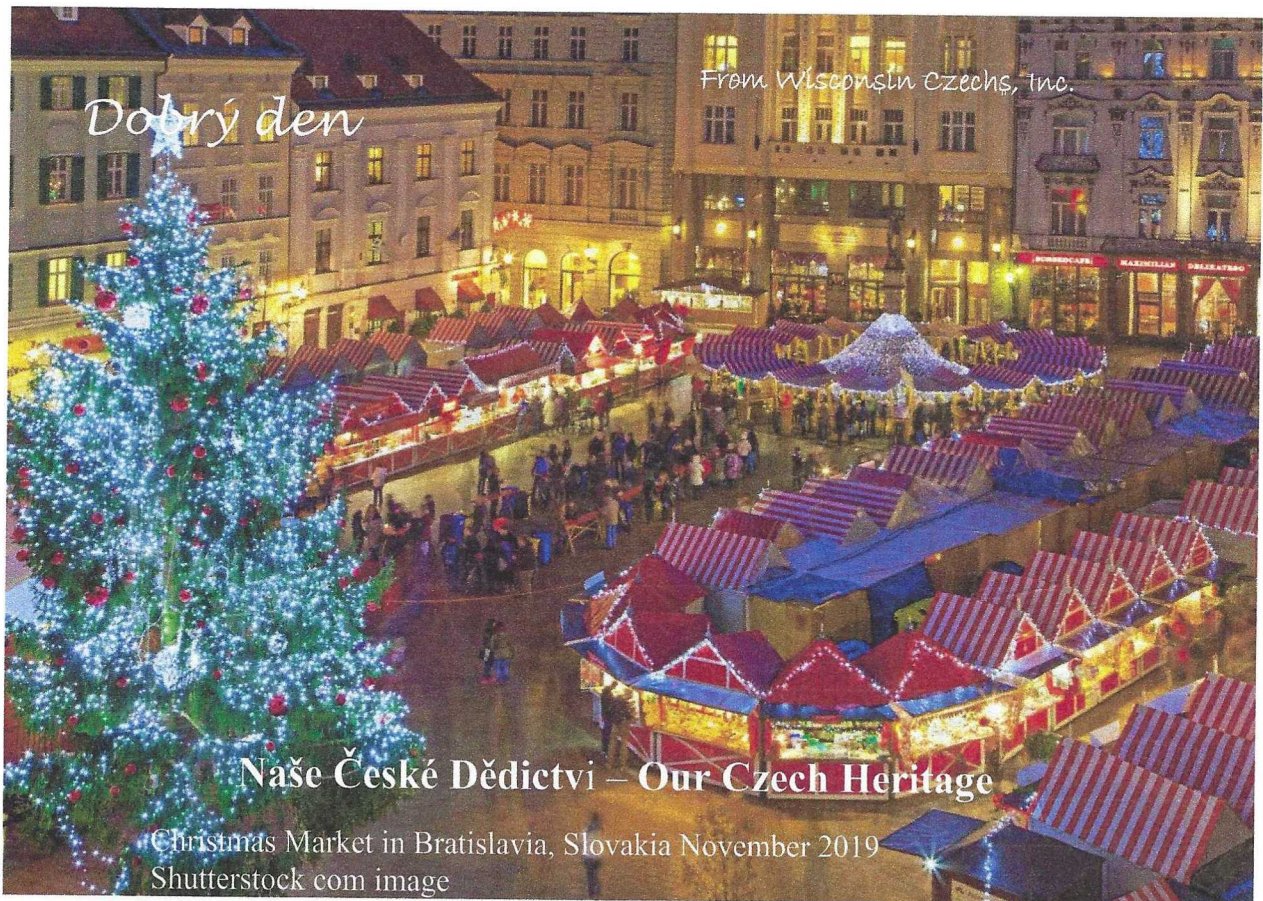

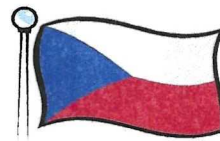

Today's event began with a presentation by exchange student Viola Danca Kova` from Brno, Czech Republic, followed by the dinner prayer given by Father Jim Dillenburg.

The meeting was called to order at 12:45pm by President Tom Cook. The members and guests stood and recited the Pledge of Allegiance.

Tom thanked the staff of Eddie Whipps for the great meal prepared and served. The members gave them a round of applause. Continued gratitude went out to Betty Schleis chairperson for today's event, Orv Konop and the Wisconsin Czech Choraliers, as well as Father Dillenburg for the mass.

Sue and Don Steinberger from the Happy Hoppers were introduced as guests as well as Viola Danca Kova` and her host mother. Julie Meyer also introduced her husband as her guest. Normally it is her mother Wilma Rehbein, but she is currently recuperating at Shady Lane. She asked if we will all keep her in our prayers.

The secretaries minutes from the May 2022 Scholarship meeting were approved. Ruth Prochazka made the motion and Mary Ann Rabitz second the motion. The minutes were approved.

There were no questions or changes in the treasurer's report. The audit of the books was completed in earlier part of this year. No issues were found.

Karen Konop had a membership update for everyone. Our current membership is at 255.

Sally Teresinski thanked her nephew and brother for her transportation to today's events. As historian she takes care of the placing of estate material in libraries and museums of members who have died. She has a table in the dance hall with a lot of material there. Some of them from her own collection and some from other members. They are free, but donations are greatly accepted. The money collected is directed to the scholarship fund. There are also cookbooks on the table for sale. Each cost \$20.00. Sally gave a brief history of the cookbooks. The first cookbook started in 1983. Martha Kliment Wagner was instrumental for this project. In 1994 Sandy Hynek, President, ordered the writing of the second cookbook, begun in 1995. The two books are companion books; there are no duplicate recipes. The cookbooks have been distributed around the region. Any proceeds from the sale of the books go directly into the scholarship fund. The first scholarship was given in 1984 at a value of \$100.00. Current vendors are listed in the Wisconsin Czech newsletters. Sally indicated she resigned from handling the cookbooks in January of 2022; she is still taking care of them because of the lack of volunteers to step forward.

The pageant committee report was given by Susan Krubsack. She indicated this wonderful event is hosted in Phillips, Wisconsin. This year's pageant was held in the park rather than its old location in the Phillips High School. Melody Muller from Milwaukee, Wisconsin is the newly elected queen. If anyone girl is interested in competing in the 2023 pageant she should contact Susan for information.

The Amazon Smile account associated with the Wisconsin Czech's has received a small donation from them. In the area of new business, the board is updating its procedural manual. The next scheduled event is our annual Christmas party. This year's chairperson is Gale Kronforst. It will be held in the hall of St Isidor the Farmer Catholic Church in Tisch Mills, Wisconsin. The dinner will be catered in by Fat Boyz. Entertainment will be proved by a Mennonite singing group.

Jim Young who is the chairperson for the 2023 Masopust indicated our date conflicts with a Happy Hoppers dance. Jim and Sue Steinberger, spokesperson for the Happy Hoppers collaborated with the idea of having the two functions together. It will be held at the Rendezvous of Luxemburg. (E896 County Road N, Luxemburg, WI) The dinner will be served buffet style at a cost of \$15.00 per person. The dinner will be a little shorter as the dancers arrive at 12 noon. The Carl Laack Band from Johnsonville, WI. The expense for the band will be shared between the two organizations. The profits made from this event will be shared as well between the Wisconsin Czechs and the Happy Hoppers. The cost of the meal also includes admission to the dance. The dinner is also open to the members of the Happy Hoppers. Individuals who wish to attend the dance who paid the \$15.00 for the meal will be given a ticket to be presented at the door. This will give you admission to the dance without paying. There will be flyers placed out in the public for the dance as well as being advertised on the TV show "Polka, Polka".

The survey for the raising of the yearly Wisconsin Czech dues came in as an even split. John Rabitz asked when the last time dues were raised. The last increase was back in 2005. 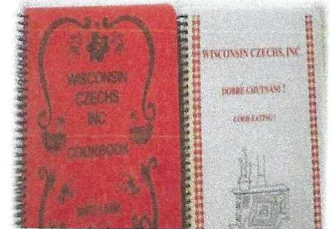

Hello, my name is Viola Dančáková and I come from Brno, Czech Republic. Brno is the second largest city in the Czech Republic with 400,000 inhabitants, which means that although we don't have as many tourists, we still have all the advantages and disadvantages of a big city. It is located in the South Moravian Region, about two hours north of Vienna and three hours southeast of Prague, the capital of the Czech Republic.

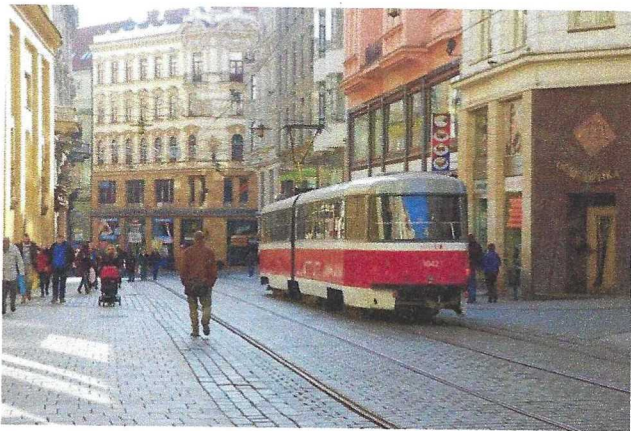


I have lived in Brno all my life, 17 years, and in that time I have developed a close relationship with the city and I cannot imagine permanently living anywhere else. That's why my two-month stay in Green Bay so far is an interesting comparison for me. Aside from the fact that Brno is about 4 times the size of Green Bay, there are bites of local cafes, bars restaurants where you can grab a beer from the Old Brno Brewery or sample coffee from local roasters. In 2022, Brno was named the city with the most diverse gastronomic establishments of any city in the Czech Republic, an attraction for many foodies. Personally, I like visiting and trying new cafes or Vietnamese restaurants the most.

Brno is also the city with the most sophisticated public transport. We may not have a metro, but our night buses, which take you to the more remote parts of the city all night long, are probably the biggest attraction for young students who come to Brno to study at university. We have three of them in Brno, namely Masaryk University (named after the first Czechoslovak president Tomáš Garrigue Masaryk), Mendel University (named after the discoverer of the laws of heredity Johann Gregor Mendel, who would have celebrated his 200th birthday this year), and the Technical University. Brno is therefore often referred to as a student city. For me, as an applicant to study medicine, Masaryk University, which boasts a modern campus that includes, for example, the most modern simulation centre in Central Europe, is the most suitable. Here, young medics can try out a simulated heart attack without endangering the life of a real patient. I'm currently a student at Notre Dame Academy in Green Bay for a year. I also attend a Catholic school in Brno, the Bishop gymnasium. However, it is not a gymnasium, as you might think, but a school with a more advanced education than the normal middle schools and high schools. I will be graduating from this school when I return from the US, which makes me happy and sad at the same time because



it is a great community and a great school. Plus, it is located in a beautiful forest park, and when I have time after school sometimes I like to walk home, which takes me about 20 minutes. While the Czech Republic and the US are very different in many ways, in the last three decades following the fall of communism, the Czech Republic has slowly but surely moved into what is known as the Western Bloc. And if you ever get the chance, definitely visit the Czech Republic, because it's worth it.

What a Difference 20 years Make by Carol Subera

This is from an article written by Carol Subera following visits to the Czech Republic with an Aunt who spoke the Czech language in 1985 and again with her Daughter in 2005. (editor's note)

Czechoslovakia- June 1985 Prague & Area

Grim cement block airport with no amenities needed Visa (some problems) our aunt spoke fluent Czech to get us in.

Passport/Visa checked 7X in 10 days with one time held for 2 hours (at hotel)

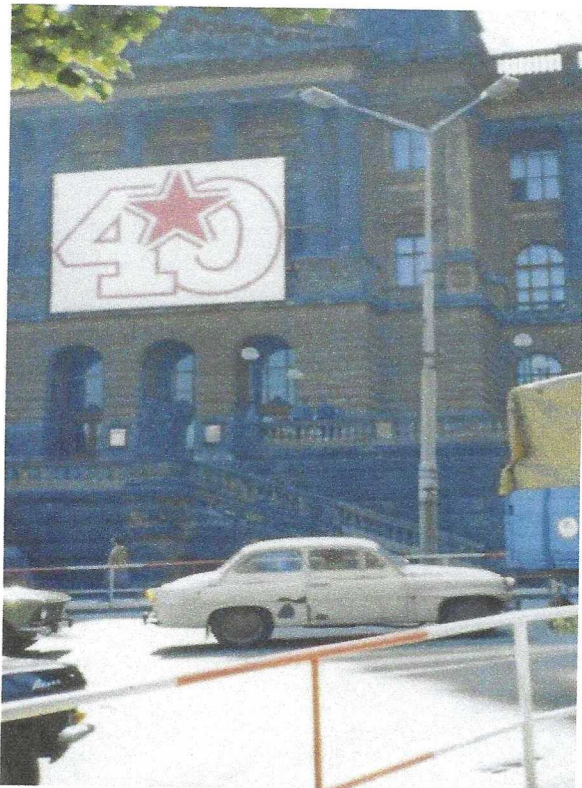
Food was limited with cucumbers the only fresh veggie and no fruit. Grocery stores very limited selection- a lot of cured meat.

Shopping was also limited and some stores only for foreigners. Note-children left outside stores with no problem.

Only black/white TV and one station available. No other technology (but it was 1985) Telephones limited.

Big red star in Main Square as there was Communist control at the time. Relatives were not happy but careful what they said and while police were not real visible-they were there.

Hotels were bare bones, no phones and very few amenities. Not a lot of tourists. Limited public restrooms and needed to pay for bad toilet paper and not real clean. There was little to no handicap accessibility. (Still true)

Totally modern, airport with no problems getting in. All amenities with shops/chain restaurants available.

No Visas needed and passports only checked when using credit cards.

All kinds of food available with ethnic/chain restaurants. Relatives had plenty of food. Last time we had to bring coffee and Jell-O.

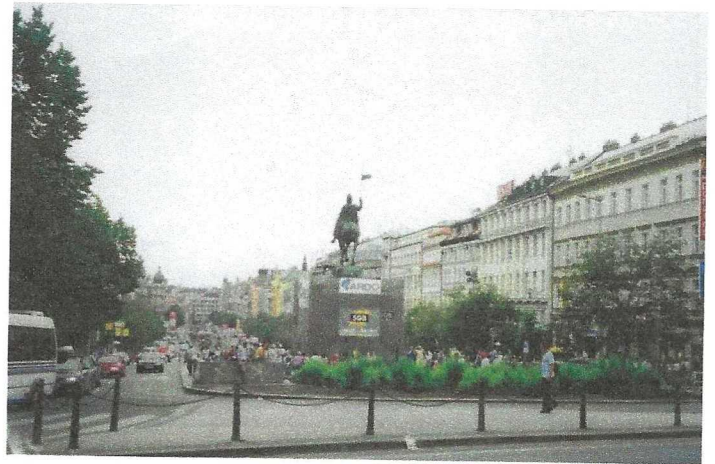
Great shopping with no problem buying garnets, this was supposedly forbidden during the 1985 trip.

TVs were modern with cable but also porn.

Everybody had cell phones and all technology available

Now an independent nation after being under many others including Nazis and Communists and you could feel their relief and sense of freedom. Since this had been a "Velvet Revolution" there were no physical battle scars. Most historical buildings also left intact during WWII.

Wonderful modern hotel including fabulous breakfasts and AC. It was owned by Russians and relatives were not real happy about that but they checked it out and approved. Much improved restrooms. Lots of tourists.

Czechoslovakia- June 1985 Prague & Area

Relatives lived in shabby pre-fab apartment and older family had extra names on their door to make it look like more lived there so it wouldn't be taken away. One daughter had defected to Switzerland in 1968 which made me a bit nervous. They also wanted to exchange our money-I declined.

Travel outside of Prague was limited as roads were not real good-no freeways but little traffic. In a little village an ice cream truck came and children ran to get this treat. By 2:00 it was all gone which was another example of the shortages Food portions in general were small everywhere. An example was Coke (the only soda) served in 6-8 ounces. But at least there were few overweight people and beer and rum was and still is plentiful.

Leaving by bus crossing the border into Austria took two hours while the guards took passports and did some luggage checks. Cars were being almost completely taken apart and there were armed guards who were very serious. Big relief when we finally crossed.

However, after we went through the Frankfurt airport, there was a bombing there which was one of the first acts of terror and didn't get a lot of publicity.

One observation of then and now-In 1985 the government was feared but there was little crime against others since punishment was swift and severe. In 2005 the government wasn't feared but there was more crime against others.

In spite of some awful Communist "new" buildings erected after WWII, the city was still beautiful.

Now they have a modern house in the suburbs with two cars. The older relatives now deceased.

Modern freeways now as relatives took us to where my ancestors came from. What a thrill to see the actual homestead of my great-grandfather and to meet distant relatives who still have the land and buildings after getting it back from the Communist government. The small towns and the landscape very much looks like where my relatives came and settled in southwestern Wisconsin.

Left by plane with no problems, but arriving at Heathrow, we found out there was another bombing in London. This was after the subway bombing just 6 days before I arrived in London and my daughter had been there at that time.

There are very strict laws against drinking and driving as in all of Europe. In the Czech Republic you can't have any alcohol while driving. Not usually a problem as there is plenty of public transportation so they drink freely. While in the country side we toured the Pilsen brewery but the driver did not try the samples.

A sign in one of the churches read "Beware of Pickpockets when praying." (The price of freedom, I guess) and church attendance is allowed. After services there was a charge to tour the church.

The city remains (in my opinion as well as many others) the most beautiful city in the world.

The Book Corner
Freedom in the Air: A Czech Flyer and his Aircrew Dog

Several years ago in going through some of my brother's things I ran across a book he had titled *The Dog Who Could Fly*. As I remember the book was written mostly from the dog's or an observer's point of view of his exploits flying with his owner on missions over Germany during World War II. At first seeming like a fictional story the book was actually based on the true events of the dog, Antis, and his owner, Czech airman Václav Robert Bozděch.

Several weeks ago hearing a person comment "I don't know why we are spending so much to help the Ukrainians, the Eastern Europeans didn't help us during World War II". I knew this wasn't true. I knew that there were a number of different nationalities who had actually served under the British and American flag as well as in the underground. However it did start me on a search for information about units from the Eastern European countries and their involvement aiding the allies. In my search I ran across the book; *Freedom in the Air: A Czech Flyer and his Aircrew Dog*. Much more than a story about World War II; It also tells of the struggle of the Czech people for their freedom following the war and the struggle and treatment of those who fought with the Allies during World War II.

The following is an overview of the book from Barnes and Noble. It is certainly a book worth reading.

This biography tells the life of a Czech airman who escapes from the Nazi invasion, fights with the French and finally arrives in Britain as an air gunner with the RAF during World War II. He returns to his homeland after World War II but escapes back to the UK when the communists take control. Again he joins the RAF and rose to the rank of Warrant Officer. The unique part of this is from his time in France, throughout World War II and until half way through his second tour with the RAF he was inseparable from his Alsatian dog, an animal that became famous and was awarded a dog equivalent of Victoria Cross. The animal flew with its owner on many bomber raids, became the squadron mascot and officially a serving RAF dog. It played an amazing part in his second escape from the Czech communist regime when the author was lucky to make it over the border to the US zone in Germany.

Goodbye, Wilma

Wilma F. Rehbein, Mishicot/Manitowoc, left for Heaven on September 19, 2022. Wilma and Donald Rehbein (1926-2007) became active members of the Wisconsin Czechs in 1995. Wilma contributed long-lasting work to our heritage. She established the group's Pageant program, now a part of the WI Czechs ethnic program offerings. We extend deepest sympathies to her family and friends. Wilma, always pleasant, was a kind lady who will be missed.

Goodbye to a Life-Long Member

Ken Schlies, a member of Wisconsin Czechs, Inc. from its inception in 1978, took part in its programs and activities in which he honored his Czech heritage. He spoke the language and continued his command of the language by taking Dr. Chester Natunewicz's Czech language classes, at UW-Manitowoc. He was always happy at meetings and contributed by serving on the Board of Directors 1988-89, again in 1990-91.
